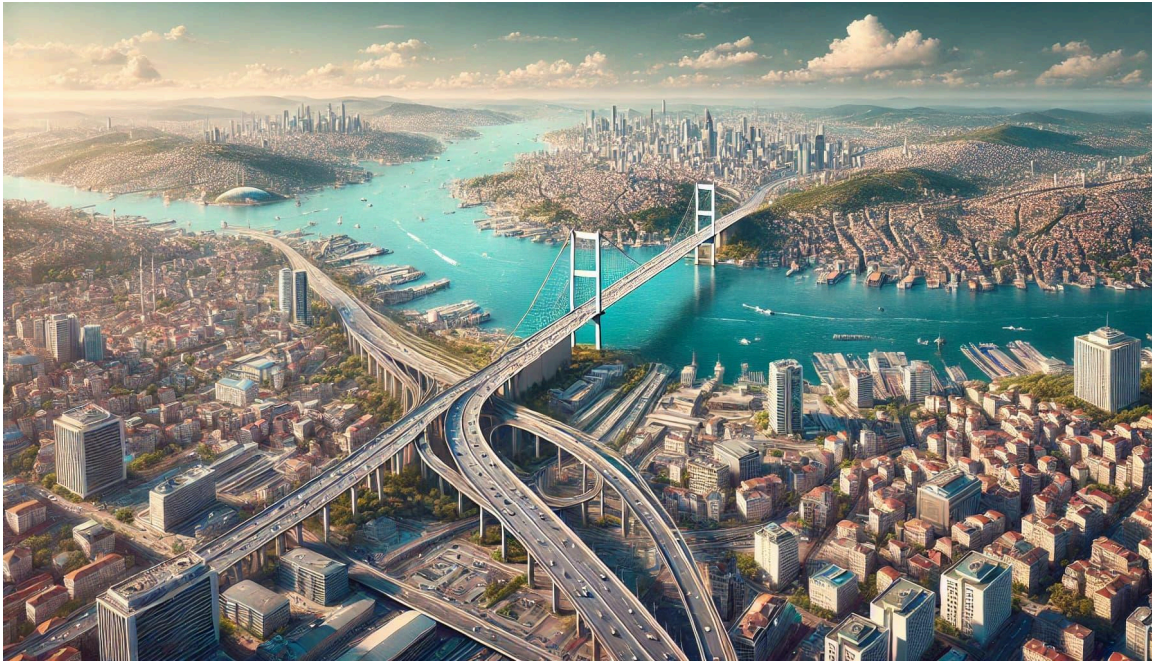
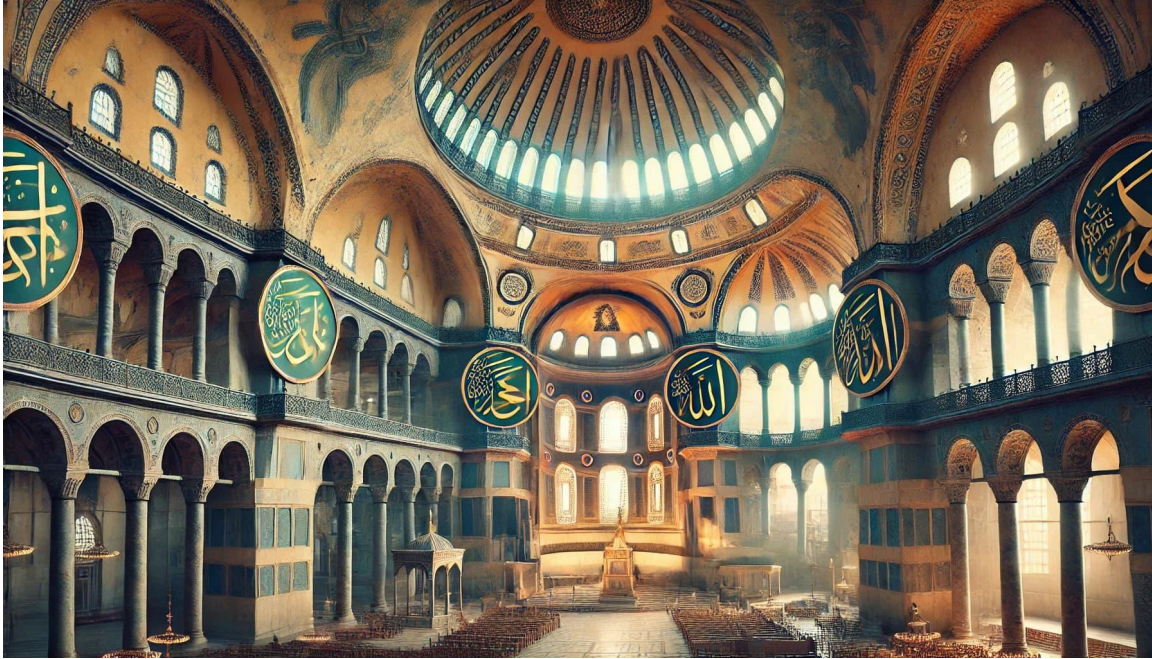


The History and Culture of Istanbul: Where East Meets West

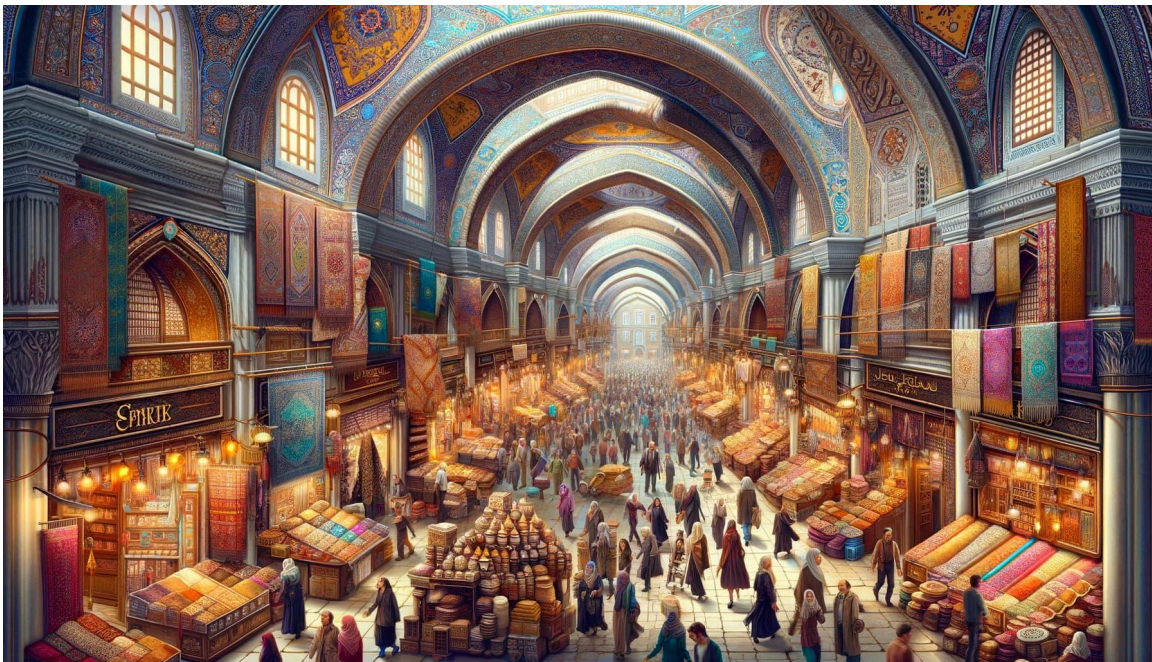
